KDEA Ride A Test – Coming Sat/Sun March 1-2 at Capall and Eagle View.

The instructors this year will be Marie Maloney, Susan Lang and Cassie Black. We will hold sessions at both Eagle View (AM Sat/PM Sun) and Capall (PM Sat/AM Sun).

Format: Sessions are 30 minutes long, and, in that 30 minutes, you can determine what you will do. You can:

- Ride a Test "straight through" and get it scored as if you were in a show. You can have a reader.
- Ride a Test and choose "do overs" in the test if you choose, being scored on 1st attempt.
- In addition to a scoresheet, get feedback from the judge on what to work on.
- Work with the judge on tips and pointers for a better test or better geometry.
- Option to re-ride the test and get it scored again (or not)
- You can also come in and ride as many tests as you can accomplish in the 30 minutes
- We will allow you to come into the ring to warm up about 10 minutes before your scheduled time, but you need to give way to the person still in their session.
- You can also opt NOT to ride a test, but declare your test level and be instructed by the judge with what you want to work on for that level.

- Last year, the Ride A Test filled, so riders will be initially scheduled for only ONE session, but if you want the option of a 2nd, you may get a 2nd ride if the clinic does not fill.
- Riders can choose which judge they do/don't want to work with, and we will do our best to accommodate. You may want to work with your "favorite" instructor, or you may want to get a different opinion/view or different venue for your ride. Communication is the key...we'll try to accommodate what you need.

HOW NOT TO BE ELIMINATED SERIES

Installment #3 – Rider has memorized the wrong test or goes off course and their trainer or friend steps in to try to correct the issue while the rider is in the competition arena.

The USEF rule states...

"DR 122.10. Unauthorized Assistance is forbidden under penalty of elimination. Any intervention by a third party, including members of the Jury, with the object of facilitating the task of the competitor, including voice, signals, remounting, catching a horse inside the ring, etc., is illegal assistance. Except in the case of an error, any outside assistance provided by or authorized by a member of the Jury will result in elimination. A member of the Jury may not discuss a ride with a competitor before the bell or after the final salute. Use of any kind of noisemaking devices or equipment including "clickers" is considered unauthorized assistance and shall be penalized by elimination."

DR 122.1 All Federation Tests may be called during the competition except, under penalty of elimination, at any Final or Championship Event at which time all tests must be ridden from memory. If test is announced, it is the responsibility of the competitor to arrange for a person to announce the test. Unless an exception is made by the judge, the announcing of the test must start with the first movement. Lateness and errors in announcing the ride will not relieve the rider from "error penalties". Announcing the tests is limited to reading the movement as it is written once only. However, the repetition of reading of a movement is acceptable if there is reason to doubt that the rider heard the original call. Calling of these tests in a foreign language must receive prior consent of the show committee and the Ground Jury. A competition cannot require competitors to use callers employed by the competition management. USEF Rulebook

In other words... While a rider is in the ring he or she may not receive direction or assistance from anybody, even from the reader if they are using one! There are limited circumstances (see above) when a reader can repeat a movement, and the reader must start reading with the first movement (i.e. someone can't step in and begin reading mid test, or step in to "bail them out" after they've gone off course and incurred an error).

But...if you are Eventing...the rule is different..

Learning wrong test at a USEA Event:

After initial error (judge will ring them off course for riding wrong test/line of travel), the judge will ask rider to stay in ring and try to ride correct test. Most riders know both tests of their level. If they have 3 errors (I.e they continue to go off course as they go along), they are scored as a "TE" for Technical Elimination. They are not permitted to leave ring, learn test, and return. (EV118.11 and EV118.9)

Convention Notes – 2024 – by Susan Lang, KDEA Delegate

Judge's Education Session – Mike Osinski

- Dressage seat equitation (DSE) has doubled in class entries, but there are not any awards for right now.
- DSE classees are an excellent source of revenue for a show (multiple people in the ring at once)
- A new working group is being formed to develop and grow the Adult Dressage Seat Eq division
- There will be better training modules for judges, show managers and ring stewards to properly manage these classes, especially at Regionals and Nationals. When only a few in class, not a big issue, but when 25 in a class, and when "workout" is required (at Nationals) the classes can last too long if not run in a timely manner (horses in ring too long...)

Bylaws Committee - Chris Trentleman

• New Group Member Organization category for 8 to 24 members.

- If a new GMO tries to form, and can't get the required 25...then can be a "Limited GMO" until they go 25+ members. They have all benefits of GMO but do not carry a vote at the Board of Governor's.
- If an existing GMO has falling membership, or if at the new December 1st membership year, the GMO has less than 25, the GMO is automatically switched to a "Limited GMO" but doesn't lose their status as a GMO (i.e. doesn't have to reapply to become a GMO). When go back above 25, raised back to "Regular" GMO>

Instructor/Trainer Committee – Lilo Fore

• Instructor/Trainer seminars are for those who want to test to become a certified instructor, but are also for those who want to LEARN but not test.

Technical Delegate Committee – Jean Kraus

- Goals to develop educational modules for Tds and show offiicals.
- Keep Tds current and keep them educating at shows.
- TD seminars are both in person and via webinars.

Judge Committee – Gary Rockwell

- The tests are beginning their revision phase, and comments/suggeztions were due December 1st.
- A few tests were too long, and others are going to have their purpose updated to better reflect horse welfare and harmony.
- Comments in general to judging committee is that the cost of showing is going up every year. No solution there, as related to increased prices for everything required to run a show.
- Horse Welfare -=- Judge's have one vantage point on a ring they can't see 360 around a horse like cameras on a ring can see.
 - Judges are criticized for not penalizing an open mouth, tongue but they can only comment upon and mark up/down for what they can actually see.
 - Media makes it seem like judges must see everything-- when each judge has their own perspective depending on where they are sitting on the ring.
 - Dressage Seat Equitation Judge, TD, Show Management, Ring Stewards must be on same page as to how class is going to be run. New protocols being developed (especially for use at Regionals and Nationals)

L Faculty Committee - Joan Darnell

- Many videos are onn line for educational purposes.
- L Program held 11 programs in 2024
- The D-1 session is being developed as an On Line Session for GMOs to show.

Competition Management -

• Trainer versus Coach – be sure you know the difference. Trainer is the person responsible for health of horse at show...coach is the instructor (whether paid or not)

- North American Youth Championship is the highest horseeshow on continent other than Olympics and Pan Am Games.
- 2025 will have Children's Division at NAYC (age 12-14)

- Junior (age 14-18)
- Young Rider (Age 16-21)
- U25 (16-25)

National Youth Programs - Roz Kinstler

- Shining Star Award does not hae to be at a Recognized show. Is for someone who shows outstanding sportsmanship.
- Spirit Award again, does not have to be at a Recognized show. Is for a kid who is enthusiastic and upbeat about competing and is positive to all.

Other Committees (no notes on these): Regional Championships, Awards, Sport Horse.

2025 National Dressage Finals will be October 29 to November 1st in Wilmington, OH

- Same footing in all rings
- 8 am to 10pm rides all Championship classes indoors
- A few non championship rides may be in outdoor arenas
- All stabling is inside
- Relatively thes ame cost
- Judges are approved by USEF
- All Regional Finals will be on TWO weekends next year, in order to get Regionals done before the (earlier) National Finals.
 - Statistics from 2023 and 2024 Finals presented by Deb Rinehart
 - In 2024 911 rides from 421 entries
 - \circ In 2023 817 rides from 375 entries
 - Remains to be seen whether entries increase with backing show up one weekend (better weather to travel) and holding at a facility with more indoor rings.

Region 4 Meeting – Anne Sushko, Region 4 Chair

- 27 Recognized shows in Region 4 in 2024
- Used 13 different Tds at those 27 shows
- Used 34 different judges at those shows (some shows had 2 or 3 judges)
- For 2025, Maffitt Lake will not bid on hosting the Regionals unless they get a confirmed \$25,000 sponsor to assist with running a quality show.
- Largest GMO in Region 4 is Central States with 337 members
- KDEA gained 11 members in 2024 over 2023

Adequan – Title Sponsor of USDF Convention – presented by Howland Mansfield, DVM

- 60% of lameness is from osteoarthritis so we need to diagnose it early
- Joint membrane gets inflamed and enzymes attack.
- Cartiledge softens and drodes until eventually bone on bone.
- Need to break the cycle of inflammation.
- Articular cartiledge is 70% water and spreads compression over joint.
- Cartiledge does not have blood supply.
- Joint fluid should be viscous and when pressure increases, then fluid degrades and it becomes skinny and no longer protects
- Signs of degenerative joint disease:
 - grumpy
 - not getting usual performance

- heat, pain, swelling
- joint enlargement
- Tips to avoid DJD
 - "motion is lotion" so make sure they get to move/turnout
 - keep the horse a healthy weight so joints are not overloaded
 - Practice good warmup and cooldown practices
- Treatments for DJD
 - NSAIDS such as HA and PSGAG
 - Surgery remove a chip
 - Regenerative PRP or IRAP
 - Alternative Therapy Acupuncture, Chiropractic, Massage
 - Rest
- Adequan is an approved drug
 - Peak level within 2 hours of administration
 - HA doubles in joint witihn 45 hours
 - Peak levels within 24 to 48 hours
 - Persisitent level for 96 hours (4 days)
 - This is why the packaging says a series of 7 vials given in 4-day intervals. Creates a high level of anti inflammatory for a LONG period of time (28 days)
 - After 1 shot you get 19% improvement in joint mobility
 - After 7 shots you get 71% improvement in joint mobility.
 - This is why the "1 shot a month" maintenance does not provide the best effect.

Biomechanics of Rider Position

- Horse biomechanics and rider biomechanics must act together.
- Rider biomechanics affects horse biomechanics.
- Seat of rider and horse's back are main area of contact.
- Rider must be supple and effective with muscles to stabilize body and develop an independent seat.
- Rider must organize and control body relative to movement of the horse.
- Impulsion are we blocking by not following, or are we not stable enough to assist the horse?
- Straightness is the rider able to be both vertically and horizontally balanced through figures (circles, corners) and when asking for bend.
- Collection Rider must have self carriage to help influence the horse.

Lilo Fore and Sarah Geike – Teaching the Flying Change

Criterion before teaching:

- Balanced canter rider mus the balanced and must balance the horse right/left
 - Collapsed horses make for crooked riders, and crooked or collapsed riders make for crooked horses.
- Adjustability in canter
- Straightness in canter (straight horse is a supple horse)
- Transitions canter-tro- canter and canter-walk-canter.
- Must know aids for canter depart and rider must be able to provide careful quiet aids for a depart (and subsequently for a flying change)

The horse that has uphill quality gaits can be introduced to the flying change sooner than a horse that is conformation-challenged or is poorly schooled.

- Start teaching the change that is easier for the horse; you do not need to do changes both directions each day.
- When teaching the change, choose a physical place in the arena where the horse WANTS to do a flying change:
- Use the same spot for the change for awhile so the careful repetition creates a horse that understands the aids.

Possible lines on which to teach the change;

- Diagonal line from E to F and then a change before F, or diagonal line from B to K then a change before K
- Shallow Loop F toward X to M -- the first time you get near X, do canter, walk, canter. The second time you school the loop, do the flying change on the 2nd half of the loop.
- Another pattern is a figure 8 that is "20 meterish" in size. Start with a simple change at X, and progress to a flying change at X when changing direction.
- Another pattern is half pass to the rail, and do a flying change upon returning to the rail.

Above all, the rider must have careful, quiet aids fro the flying change. If the rider an accomplish a quiet, quality canter-walk-canter, then the flying change should have the same quality.

Other Presentations.

I also listened to several other presentations, but as the presentations were on a Powerpoint, and went quite fast (there's never enough time) I was not able to write up any (coherent) notes on these. One was a session with a Mitochondrial Biologist (Dr Sarah White Springer) who spoke about research to quantify "fatigue" in horses, down to the cellular level. Presentation by David O'Connor, USEF Chief of Sport

Start off with some statistics:

39 million people (10% of US population) have an interest in horses in sport.

2 million actually own a horse

In 1920, there were 26 million horses in the US

in 1960, there were 3 million horses in the US

In 2024, ther are 7 million horses in the US

70% of the US population have no positive or negative feeling about horses, but media outlets (TV, social media, podcasts, etc), special interest groups, pictures, videos grab them and then they take on that view or idea of horses (whether based in fact or not).

Social License to Practice is the public acceptance of your activity to exist and operate. As people who support and participate in horse sports, we must cultivate and maintain the trust of the general public to maintain our "license" with the public to continue with our horse sports.

We also must think about ALL horse sports, not just dressage, or jumping, or Olympic sports, but ALL horse sports (racing, rodeo, breed shows, hunting, steeplechasing, vaulting, etc. The general public does not distinguish between disciplines as they just see a horse, so a horse in any sporting activity, in any picture on social media, influences the public's perception of horse sports in general. In addition, 70% of the general public forms its perceptions of horse sports not based on knowledge, but based on the

EMOTION they feel when looking at a video, post, or picture. We all must acknowledge that "social license to practice" is all of our responsibility with what we say, how we teach/train, what we post, or what we promote.

Survey:

- 67% of the **public** responded that horses do NOT enjoy being in their sport.
- 33% of **public** responded that horses DO enjoy being in their sport
- Horse People
- 50% of horse people responded that they think horses enjoy their sport
- 50% of horse people responded that they thing horses do NOT enjoy their sport.
- This is somewhat troubling, as 50% of those "in the know" believe horses do not enjoy themselves in their sport.

The five domains of animal welfare are:

- Nutrition: The quality and variety of food and water available
- Environment: The physical space, air quality, and environmental change
- Health: The animal's physical fitness, and whether they are free of disease and injury
- **Behavior**: The animal's opportunities to play, explore, and socialize
- Mental state: The animal's subjective experiences, such as fear, anxiety, or distress

A horse or an animal can be uncomfortable or unhappy for a moment, but overall have a comfortable life with positives in the 5 domains. However, if the public sees a moment of "unhappiness" depicted in a photo or video, then they may believe that "moment" is their whole life.

So as members of the horse community, we must be very cognizant of horse welfare and work to create quality lives for our horses in sport. Of course, we must speak out when there is a horse welfare issue that needs to be addressed, and USEF has a very strong emphasis on horse welfare and reporting of welfare issues. As horse owners or enthusiasts, we must also be careful about what we post, what we say, how we train, how we teach, as one "unhappy moment" in an otherwise comfortable and well cared-for life and threaten our "social license to practice" our ability to own horses and use them in sport.
